


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WELCOME

Welcome to camp. As the Senior Patrol Leader of your troop, you have an important role to fill this week. With that role comes certain responsibilities. Your troop is counting on you to lead them through the week. It is also your chance to show your troop that they have chosen the right person for the job.

In addition to being the leader of your troop, you are also the link between your troop and the camp staff. As the Program Director, it is my job to give you the information and support you need to make that happen. Think of me as your assistant and your advisor.

The purpose of this guide is to help you. It will answer many of the questions you might have. Consult it often. If you can't find the answers to your questions or you need help with anything, let me know. I will do everything I can to help you and your troop have a great week at camp.

CHECK-IN PROCEDURES

Once you arrive at camp you will need to gather your troop together. A staff member will find you and guide your troop through check-in and escort you to your campsite. Once there, drop off your gear, buy don't unpack yet. There will be time for that later. Your troop will need to change into swimsuits for your swim tests. While they are getting ready, you, your staff guide, and a troop leader will need to do a campsite inspection. Check for anything that needs to be repaired or replaced. We want to make sure your campsite is ready for the week. You, your troop leader, and your guide will sign the sheet when the inspection is finished. Your guide will then take your troop through the rest of check-in. This includes photos, swim tests, medical checks, dining hall orientation, shooting sports orientation, and a general tour of camp. When check-in is finished, you can return to your campsite and set up.



QUARTERMASTER

While inspecting your campsite with your guide, you will notice some essential items such as some wood tools, latrine supplies, and cooking supplies if you are doing patrol cooking. Your guide will check these with you and take care of anything that is missing or needs to be replaced. If you need any other supplies or equipment, have your Troop Quartermaster see the camp clerk for assistance. If you find yourself in need of anything throughout the week come to the same place.

COLORS

The morning colors ceremony will begin at 7:45 on the parade field next to the dining hall. Line up behind your troop's marker on the field. The Program Director will check to see if your troop is present and on time. The ceremony will then begin. After the ceremony SPLs will be invited to the daily SPL meeting and troops will be dismissed into the dining hall.

The evening colors ceremony will begin at 5:45. Line up behind your troop's marker on the parade field and the ceremony will begin just as is it had for morning colors. After the ceremony, troops will be dismissed to the dining hall for the evening meal.

Your troop may wish to provide the color guard for a flag ceremony. If so, see the

Program Director to make the necessary arrangements. You will need to give enough advance notice so that you can practice the ceremony. If your troop has a bugler, he will also be welcome to participate.



MEALS

Troops may enter the dining hall for breakfast at 7:45. Follow the instructions of the dining hall steward to finish setting up. Lunch will be served at 12:15. Report to the dining hall and wait outside. The dining hall steward will let you know when to enter. Dinner will be served after the evening colors ceremony. For all meals please enter in silence and stand at you table until grace is offered. You may then be seated. The dining hall steward will then instruct you on what to do. When the meal is over, the staff will conduct a program of songs and announcements. You will then be dismissed by a staff member.

Waiters need to report to the dining hall 15 minutes before colors to set up. While



setting the tables, waiters should take a staff totem from the mantle for each empty seat at your tables. This is a nice way to invite a staff member to eat with your troop.

If your troop is doing patrol cooking, someone from your troop needs to report to the rear porch of the dining hall to pick up your food and supplies. Make sure this is done with enough time that your troop can enjoy a leisurely meal.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

If at any time you hear the camp alarm sound, it means we have an emergency situation. <u>Everyone</u> in camp needs to stop what they are doing and report <u>immediately</u> to the parade field at the dining hall. Assemble by troop and remain quiet. Attendance will be taken. Make sure you have an accurate count. You will be called by troop. Respond as follows:

"All present, sir."

(Everyone from your troop is present.)

"We are missing '#', sir."

(Someone is absent and you don't know where they are.

(We will question you further.)

Sometimes this will be a drill. In all cases, however, you must respond as if this were the real thing. Remember, time is extremely important. Be Prepared!

SENIOR PATROL LEADER

There will be a Senior Patrol Leader Meeting every morning, Monday through Friday on the parade field. The meeting will take place after the colors are raised and before you go to breakfast. It would be helpful if you bring something to write with and something to write in. There may information given at the meeting that won't be published anywhere else so it is important that you are able to give that information to your troop.

There will be a weekly wrap-up meeting on Thursday evening after Vespers. This meeting is usually held in the Conference Room of the barn. This will be your chance to tell us how we did during the week and even to offer suggestions for the future.



COMMISSIONER

The Camp Commissioner will visit your campsite daily. One of his or her goals is to make sure your campsite is clean and safe. During the visit he or she might want someone to walk through with them. Don't worry or be nervous when they visit. Remember, the goal is to make sure things are safe for your troop. When finished, an inspection sheet will be posted on your bulletin board. This sheet will have a score and possible suggestions for improvement. There is also space for you to do your own inspection before the commissioner arrives.

Here are some things you and your troop can do to insure a successful visit:

- \Rightarrow Make sure tents are neat and clean.
- \Rightarrow All tent flaps should be uniform (all up or all down).
- \Rightarrow All personal equipment should be put away.
- \Rightarrow Clotheslines must be at least six feet high.
- \Rightarrow Nothing should be hanging from the outriggers.
- \Rightarrow Clean out the fire circle
- \Rightarrow Pick up trash.
- \Rightarrow Have a well defined axe yard.

Also, you will want to build a gateway to your campsite and display your troop flag. This will help to identify your troop and show pride in who you are.

VESPERS

A Scout is Reverent. An Interfaith Chapel Service will take place on Thursday evening at 9:00 in the chapel. Your Chaplain's Aide is invited to participate in the service. Please enter the chapel area with reverence and respect. All are welcome and encouraged to attend.



CAMPWIDE CHALLENGE

The Campwide Challenge and will be held on Tuesday evening. This year's Campwide Challenge will be based on Carnival Games. Well, at least our interpretation of them. Don't worry, you won't need tickets to play but you will need to put up with our carnival barkers trying to get you to play their games.



CAMPFIRE PROGRAM



There will be two campfires during the week. The first is on Sunday evening and presented to you through the courtesy and talents of the staff. Assemble in the meadow by the Nature area at 7:30. We will proceed together to the campfire circle.

The second campfire is your troop's moment to shine. It is now your turn to show off for the staff and your parents. We will meet Friday evening at the same time and

place: 7:30 by the Nature area.

To participate, make arrangements with the Program Director during the week to audition your act. You must do this before Thursday at 5:00. All acts need to reflect the ideals and values of Scouting. If you have any questions, see the Program Director.


Two additional duties of the SPL are to help build Friday's campfire and to help serve as M.C. for Friday night. The Program Director will give you more details at the daily SPL meeting.

While watching both campfires, please remember that a Scout is courteous.

BADEN-POWELL PATROL

There is more to summer camp than just merit badges. Each patrol has the opportunity to earn the Baden-Powell Patrol Award. To earn this award, each patrol will have a number of activities to complete. Some are required and some are optional. Check to make sure that the proper person signs each requirement. While the award allows scouts to practice many skills, the main objective is to build team work within the patrol. As patrols complete the requirements, have the patrol leaders turn the sheets in to the Program Director. Please be sure they are turned in by noon on Friday.

Each patrol will need its own score sheet, a copy of which is included at the end of this guide.



TROOP AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

While the Baden-Powell Patrol Award allows team work within the patrol, the Troop Award of Excellence brings all of your patrols together for a common goal. This award has a number of requirements that your troop will need to complete to earn the award. These will encourage your troop to live by the ideals of the Scout Oath and Law. Again, please return the score sheet to the Program Director by noon on Friday.

Make sure you are using a new sheet from this year. Some changes have been made to the requirements. A copy of the sheet is included at the end of this guide.


