
Scout Trips

Listing of Ranks in order: Scout, Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life, and Eagle.

Scoutmaster Conference :

- Required for all 7 ranks.
- It's simply a visit between the Scoutmaster and a Scout. During the conference, the two can discuss the Scout's
 ambitions and life purpose, set goals for future achievement (both in Scouting and beyond), review the Scout's
 participation in the troop and explore his understanding and practice of the ideals of Scouting. The conference
 also gives the Scoutmaster an opportunity to solicit feedback on the troop program and any challenges the
 Scout is facing.
- It can be done anytime within the current rank.
- Scout cannot fail the Scoutmaster Conference, it is not a test
- With the Scoutmaster's permission, a Scoutmaster Conference may be done by an assistant Scoutmaster.

Board of Review

- Required for 6 of the ranks (not part of Scout rank)
- Completed after all the requirements of the rank are completed.
- Its purpose is to determine the quality of the Scout's experience and decide whether the requirements for the rank have been fulfilled. If so, the board not only approves the Scout's advancement but also provides encouragement to continue the quest for the next rank.
- Board of review date is the effective advancement date.

Merit Badges

- Pick a Subject
- Notify the Scoutmaster of your interest in earning a Merit Badge. If you cannot find a counselor, he will help you to find one.
- Ask the Scoutmaster for a Blue Card **<u>BEFORE</u>** starting the merit badge.
- Scout Buddy System. Never meet with a counselor alone.
- Make contact with a Merit Badge Counselor.
- Work on the requirements, make sure the Counselor approves prior to working on the requirement.
- Show your knowledge of the requirement to the Counselor.
- Receive signoff of each requirement and for the completion of the Merit Badge.
- Get the Scoutmaster's signature on the blue card after completing the Merit Badge.
- Turn in the blue card.
- Receive the Merit Badge.

Here is what the Blue Card looks like. The scout should <u>ALWAYS</u> keep his copy of the card for his own records. It will be given back to him when he receives the merit badge at a COH.

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Courts of Honor

- Formal recognition with families, friends, and the public in attendance.
- All Scouts who have moved up in rank are recognized, except Eagle Scout rank. They will have a separate COH just for their Eagle Ceremony.
- All scouts who have earned merit badges receive them at the COH.
- Review of past scouting events.
- Review of upcoming events.
- Special awards and announcements.
- 4 times a year.
 - February and August (Sunday afternoon)
 - May and November (replaces Monday meeting)

Each scout has a fundraising account.


Funds raised must be used for trips, summer camp or any other scout-related expenses. Cannot simply be "cashed out".

Troop

• Chicken BBQ (First Saturday in June)

Used for troop expenses, tents, equipment or anything else to support the scouts.

Everyone is expected to help to make this event a success. It is our one big fundraiser for the year.



- Troop believes it is wise to teach each new scout about the knife, saw and axe. Because we want our scouts to be safe, we have each new scout go through a Totin Chip training before they are allowed to carry or use any of these three items in the Troop. There are a couple leaders that teach this class and we try to do it on camp outs and sometimes we meet on a Saturday or weeknight to get it done. It normally takes less than 2 hours.
- Read and understand woods tools use and safety rules from the Scouts BSA handbooks.
- Demonstrate proper handling, care, and use of the pocketknife, ax, and saw.
- Use knife, ax, and saw as tools, not playthings.
- Respect all safety rules to protect others.
- Respect property. Cut living and dead trees only with permission and good reason.
- Subscribe to the Outdoor Code.
- The Scout's Totin' Rights can be taken away if they fail in their responsibility
