### **ROUNDTABLE – CUB SCOUT OVERNIGHT CAMPING POLICIES**

Camping certainly adds to overall Scouting experience.

Getting outdoors whether to hike or go camping is important part of retaining Scouts.

And recruiting parents to be leaders

**SAFE-** all activities are to be conducted safely and to ensure safety of participants leaders should use the four points of SAFE when delivering Scouting program

Supervision - qualified and trustworthy adults – **BALOO trained and Hazardous Weather** 

Assessment – activities are assessed for risks

Fitness and Skill- Medical form and activity is right for age, maturity, and physical abilities

Equipment and Environment -appropriate clothing, equipment good repair, assessing weather

## Age appropriate guidelines for Scouting Activities must be followed

Breakdown by den (required and elective):

<u>Lion</u>- Mountain Lion – req. - hike Let's Camp – elec attend Council/district overnight or pack/family overnight

<u>Tiger</u>- Tigers in the Wild – req. -hike Let's Camp elec

<u>Wolf</u>- Paws on the Path – req – hike Let's Camp – elect

<u>Bear</u>- Bear Habitat – outdoor walk Let's Camp

<u>Webelos</u> – Webelos Walkabout Let's Camp – elec

<u>AOL</u> – Outdoor Adventure – required

Tenting – Cub Scouts may share tent with parent/guardians

All Other programs youth and adults must be separate

#### Different ways to go camping:

Council or District event: Program is planned for you give you chance to know families – develop friendship – recruit leadership

Pack Organized camp on own at least one leader must be BALOO (Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation) as of Sept.1, 2023 – Cubs may camp 2 nights location – must be approved by local council with Pack Overnight Site Appraisal Form on file must plan activities

Webelos and Arrow of Light- den coordinated campout Still in Cub Scouts so must still have BALOO trained leadership- Cub Scout rules apply Still must be with parent guardian no parent- two registered leaders may agree to be responsible Webelos cannot camp with BSA Troop

Arrow of Light may attend Troop campout -Should have parent BALOO trained leader must be present-- two deep leadership Age appropriate must be followed

As of June 1, 2023 Camping policies for Webelos and Arrow of Light groups have been separated Both can camp as den

Webelos cannot camp with BSA Troop either at Troop or district/council events

Arrow of Lighters can participate and camp at unit coordinated campouts with BSA troop

as long as have two deep leadership

Cub Scout Adults

Cub Parents do not have to be BSA registered All leaders and other adults must be registered

Lions and Tigers must have adult parent/guardian Wolf, Bears must have adult parent/guardian, but in exceptional circumstances another registered leader who is a parent of a Cub Scout attending the campout, must be allowed to have 1 non-family youth member to be responsible for – with ok of leader and parent/guardian

#### Siblings and Cub Scout camping:

In Cub Scout camping, unregistered siblings are encouraged to attend pack-coordinated events as it's a family-centered program, and parents/ guardians can share a tent with their family, including siblings.
