## **Connections in Scouting America**

The Journey To Excellence (JTE) program was disbanded at the end of 2024. The new program is called Connections. This program tracks six different categories, five of which have a standard for that category. The categories are: outdoor activities, membership growth and unit size, advancement, adult training, and retention. Membership growth, unit size, adult training and retention are completed by National while the other two are completed from unit entries in Scoutbook.

- **Outdoor Activities**: For packs, it is outdoor activities in the program. For troops, it is a long-term camping (like summer camp). For crews, it is a Tier 3 activity. This needs to be updated in Scoutbook to be counted.
- Membership: fulfilled a +1 growth over the previous year for a standard unit or maintaining the large unit status.
- Unit Size: The standard for unit size is 20+ for Cubs, 12+ for troops, or 7+ for crews.
  - A large unit is defined as 50+ for Cubs, 30+ for troops or 15+ for crews
- Advancement: 30+% of the members for packs and troops have advanced at least one rank. For crews, the youth officers have been trained by peers. This needs to be updated in Scoutbook to be counted.
- Adult Training: The Unit Leader and the Committee Chair are position specific trained.
- Retention: There is no standard for retention at this point although various figures have been discussed.

The Commissioner core is discussing a proposal for a Council designation (Commissioner Unit of Excellence) for units that have achieved a certain number of standards as well as another item such as a certain number of attendances at Roundtable. The expectation is to roll out the plan in September.

National is tracking the categories listed above. It is important that advancement and outdoor activities are posted in Scoutbook so a true picture of the unit activities can be seen.
